# **Photo Spotlight**

Field trip co-leader USGS geologists Don Swanson (tallest man at right in hat) and participants of the recent NWGS field trip to Kīlauea stand atop a scarp of the White Rabbit fault, a prominent structure in the Koa'e fault zone, southern flank of Kīlauea volcano, Big Island of Hawai'i. This mind-blowing zone is about 9 km long and 2.5 km wide and is a zone of extension, with measured amounts of extension (crack opening) as high as 30 m on a lava flow 600-700 years old, making it one of the most active fault zones in the world (extension rate of 4.3-5.0 cm/yr). Fiske and Swanson interpret the Koa'e as a breakaway zone separating the relatively stable part of the volcano to the north from the mobile flank. Photo by T. Bush.
