October 12 Program Speaker

Speaker: Tom Pratt, Affiliate Professor, UW Dept. of ESS **Title:** The Seattle fault: A new look at the cracks in our

basement

Abstract: Seismic reflection profiles, geologic and topographic data, and computer modeling of fault slip are consistent with the northern edge of the Seattle fault zone

(SFZ) being a blind thrust fault directly beneath downtown Seattle, about 1.5 km north of where previous estimates have placed it. Computer models of fault slip also indicate that ruptures on backthrusts within the SFZ are likely caused by moderate (M~6.5-6.7) earthquakes on the main thrust faults, rather than being caused by small earthquakes (M5.5-6.0) restricted to the backthrusts. Backthrust ruptures have occurred at least 4 times in the past 2500 years, making moderate earthquakes the most likely SFZ hazard. These results suggest that the downtown area of Seattle could experience localized, fault-parallel ground rupture and tilting during both large events (M7+) and more moderate (M~6.5) earthquakes.


