Speaker: Dr. Vicki McConnell, Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries

Title: Everything you always wanted to know about state geological surveys, but whom to ask?

Abstract: State geologic surveys collectively employ over 2000 professional and support staff and represent total revenues of a guarter of a billion dollars annually.

We estimate that 500 to 700 students are employed by state geologic sur-

veys as full time staff, interns, or seasonal field assistants. The individual surveys may have responsibilities and missions ranging from basic geologic mapping to regulating oil and gas exploration and development. Their collective missions lie in providing unbiased science information and data for their state decision makers and the citizens. Primary areas of work are in geologic mapping, energy and mineral resource investigations, water resource management, natural hazard mitigation, geosciences data preservation, and applied research and education.

I will give an overview of work we are conducting at Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries to illustrate the variety and depth of applied geoscientific research at a state geologic survey. Highlights will include tsunami inundation modeling and mapping, landslide inventories using lidar derived digital elevation models, geothermal resource research, and examples of our web based interactive maps.

Upcoming Speakers and Field Trips



Everest expedition currently underway commemorating the 50th anniversary of the first American ascent, sponsored by National Geographic, The North Face, and Montana State University.
