attle to find a range of rocks equal to any assembled by plate tectonics. Furthermore, building stones provide the foundation for constructing stories about cultural as well as natural history. In his talk, David will explore stone ranging from 3.5-billion years old to 120,000 years old. He will discuss history, transportation, and architecture to give you a new way to appreciate urban geology. This talk is based on his book, *Stories in Stone: Travels Through Urban Geology*.
