Speaker: Pat Pringle, Centralia College Emeritus, Buried and submerged forests of the Pacific Northwest—Clues to ancient volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, and landslides

Abstract: This presentation will be a snapshot tour of selected sites where subfossil trees have been found. I'll review my investigations and those of colleagues who have been using tree-ring analysis to unravel mysteries about the timing of ancient eruptions, earthquakes, and landslides of the Pacific Northwest. This tour will include updates about recent and/or ongoing dating work at Mounts Hood and Rainier, in the Columbia River Gorge, the Puget Lowland, Cascade Range, and Olympic Mountains.


