**Title:** Geology of Iceland: la Terre Vivante (the living earth)

Abstract: Iceland's unique tectonic setting controls its very active geological processes. Situated on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge and over the Iceland hotspot, vast amounts of basaltic lava have formed the Iceland plateau and keep Iceland's "fires" going today. In addition to older, active volcanic systems, a recently reawakened volcanic zone on the Reykjanes Peninsula has commenced eruptions between the Keflavík International Airport and the capital city of Reykjavík. A volcanic system is the principal geological structure in Iceland and about 31 volcanic systems are located on its active volcanic zones. In Iceland a volcanic system consists of a fissure swarm, a central volcano, or both. These volcanic areas are controlled by the tectonics that are pulling Iceland apart where the North American and Eurasian plates meet. The volcanic terrain of Iceland has been greatly influenced by ice and subglacial volcanic landforms can be still seen, leftovers from the Ice Age. About 11% of Iceland is covered by ice today and melting is predicted to result in increased eruption rates. Historic eruptions on Iceland have had far-reaching and drastic results and Iceland's volcanoes are capable of producing such eruptions again at any time.
